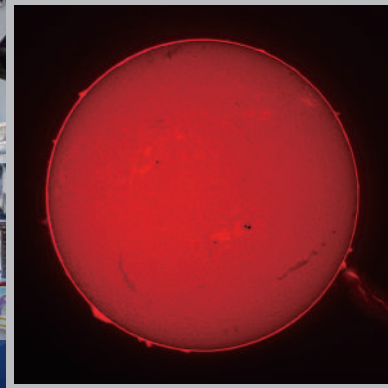

Sapporo Astronomical Observatory

Sapporo Astronomical Observatory is in Nakajima Park, a recreational area in the center of Sapporo. It is located on a hill between the Sapporo Concert Hall "Kitara" and Hoheikan (Historical Guest House). The hill is commonly known as "Okadayama". These are the remains of an artificial hill in the Okada Flower Garden, a classic Japanese-style garden that once existed.

In July 1958, an observatory equipped with a 20 cm refracting telescope (manufactured by Tokyo Optical Co., Ltd.) was built as the Snow Brand Milk Products Pavilion for the Hokkaido Grand Fair held at the Nakajima Park site. The Snow Brand Milk Products Pavilion was later donated to the City of Sapporo, which placed it under the jurisdiction of the Sapporo Board of Education and opened it as the Sapporo Astronomical Observatory in October of the same year. In 1984, the telescope was replaced by a 20 cm refracting telescope manufactured by Goto Inc., continuing to provide a window to the universe for the local community.

Although it is a very small observatory with an area of about 52m², it has been providing a watchful eye on Sapporo and the universe for more than 60 years with the support of the citizens.
